2023 has been our most academically successful year at Waranara School. For the first time in our history we have had all bar 1 HSC students receiving a band 2 or higher for their HSC final Mark.

For the first time in our history we have had the highest percentage of students at 46% receiving a band 4 or higher in their HSC final Mark. For the First time in our history we had 3 students receive all band 4 and 5's for every subject for their HSC.

For our year 10's we have had the highest number of C Grade or above for all compulsory RoSA subjects than ever before in our history, with 73% of students receiving a Grade C or above. These are fantastic results and demonstrate the dedication of our staff and hard work of our students. We have now created a school that has real academic rigour and has developed a curriculum that differentiates and supports students to access learning and subject content and enables them to then thrive and achieve great results.

This year we implemented the Flourish program. This program was used for students to rate their own wellbeing in 6 different domains. It then opened up a platform for wellbeing staff to discuss the students' different domains and for the students to access an array of different resources to support them in the various wellbeing domains. This has been a really useful tool for students and for staff to support the wellbeing of our students.

We implemented more rigorous literacy testing of our students to then enable us to provide specific adjustments in the classroom and, for those with higher needs, specific one on one literacy intervention programs.

I would like to thank the Waranara Staff, students, volunteers, parents and carers and the community for their continued hard work and support of the school and it's students. It is a team effort that ensures that we are continuing to make Waranara a unique, supportive and caring school.

About the school



Waranara School is characterised by its personalised teaching and learning support.



At Waranara School we believe all young people have a right to access educational opportunities that positively respond to their individual life circumstances and personal attributes.

Our school supports young people, particularly those experiencing trauma or mental health challenges, to re-engage in education.

Context

Waranara School is an Accredited Special Assistance secondary school (Year 9 to Year 12) based in Marrickville, NSW.

Good Shepherd Australia New Zealand opened Waranara School, formerly known as The Waranara Centre, in February 2015. Initially catering to Years 9 and 10, the school now includes a senior campus for Years 11 and 12.

Waranara School assists students to achieve the Record of School Achievement (RoSA), Higher School Certificate (HSC) and pursue careers through access to work experience, vocational courses and certificate courses at TAFE.


In particular, we assist young people experiencing anxiety or mental health challenges to stay connected to their education. Since educational outcomes are intrinsically linked to wellbeing, Waranara offers support to students across different aspects of their life. This includes individual teaching and learning support and specialised wellbeing support.

Waranara School is characterised by its personalised teaching and learning support. Young people benefit from small class sizes and a strengths-based, trauma-informed approach. Teachers work closely with students to identify their unique characteristics and skills and develop learning strategies based on these strengths. Our staff work alongside parents/carers, caseworkers, psychiatrists and psychologists to support students in addressing issues that may affect their education or wellbeing. Our students and their families also have the opportunity to access other Good Shepherd programs and services. This includes counselling services and ParentWise, a parenting program for parents and carers of adolescents.

Characteristics of the student body

In 2023, 77 students were enrolled over the year, with 57–60 students being enrolled at any one time. Students transition out of Waranara School when they feel ready to move to a different educational setting.

Some students stay a number of years at Waranara while others return to their previous school or another educational setting after reaching their goals in a much shorter time. Across the year the total student enrolment consisted of:



Philosophy



Waranara School believes all young people have the right to access education in an environment that responds to their personal needs and circumstances. Its educational philosophy is underpinned by six key principles.



Holistic support

Students receive "wrap-around" support services to help them increase their wellbeing and engage with education.

Student collaboration

The school encourages students to identify goals and develop tailored, practical learning strategies in collaboration with their teachers. This empowers students to become the change-makers in their own lives.

The school offers students tailored learning and wellbeing support based on their unique needs and circumstances.

Positive connections

Teachers and staff focus on developing strong, positive relationships with young people so they can become more comfortable, confident and responsive to the education and wellbeing support provided to them.

Social justice

Waranara school supports young people experiencing mental illness or significant life challenges to re-engage in education through specialised education and wellbeing support.

Strengths-based development

Waranara School is characterised by its strengths-based, student-centred approach. Teachers and staff work closely with students to identify and build on their strengths, inside and outside the classroom.

Each year, the Matana Foundation for Young People supports Waranara School with a \$50,000 grant, which supports the Transition Support Coordinator role. This enables the school to support students for two years as they transition out of Waranara to higher education or the workforce.

Along with government funding, this generous grant ensures the continuity of Waranara School.



Academic outcomes



We believe all young people have the right to access education in an environment that responds to their personal needs and circumstances.



The school offers the NSW Education Standards Authority's curriculum for Stage 5 (Years 9 and 10) and Stage 6 (Years 11 and 12), assisting students to achieve a Year 10 Record of School Achievement (RoSA) and HSC.

We also offer students the opportunity to work towards the HSC through a "compressed" model. Over a two-year period, students study three subjects per year from a choice of six subjects, covering both preliminary courses and the HSC course in each subject in a 12-month period.

2023 HSC outcomes

In 2023, 27 students sat for the NSW HSC in six courses offered at Waranara School. In total, 24 per cent of our students achieved Bands 1-2 (40-59 marks), with 76 per cent of all students being placed in Bands 3-6 (60-100 marks).

13 students completed the required course load to complete their HSC in 2023. No students completed a vocational course through NSW TAFE.

Workforce composition

In 2023, Waranara School comprised 15 staff who worked closely with one another to support young people's education and wellbeing.

Our school was also fortunate to have the assistance of volunteer tutors recruited through The Centre for Volunteering, Sydney. In 2023, 1 tutor volunteered once a week to support students with their studies on a regular basis. 4 volunteers assisted students with Disability Adjustments in HSC exams.

One staff member of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander background was employed on a full time basis.

Attendance



In many instances, students join Waranara School following long periods of absence at their previous school.




Most students are referred to the school due to ongoing school refusal often caused by poor mental health or other issues such as bullying, family problems and complex trauma. School attendance is viewed as fundamental for improved educational outcomes. Our staff work closely with students and their support networks to develop strategies that assist them to improve and maintain their attendance.

Managing non-attendance

Every fortnight the two student wellbeing advisors, Principal and Deputy Principal meet and use the Multi Tiered System of Support (MTSS) to monitor school attendance (see flowchart below).




In 2023, 88% of students who completed Year 10 at Waranara School continued on to senior study at the school.



Post-school destinations of Year 12 graduates




School policies

Student satisfaction

Exiting students were surveyed in 2023 about their experience of Waranara School. Students were asked in a questionnaire, "Please describe how your life has changed since attending Waranara School."

Some responses were:

"I have started going to school regularly. I am also a lot more open with my friends."

"I've become much more independent than when I first started. I'm very able to control aspects of my life such as using public transport, messaging friends, doing schoolwork, sleep schedule etc."

"My life has changed positively because I have a lot more self-confidence. It has also changed me academically."

"Given me time to grow. Due to this, I feel less socially awkward."

"My self confidence has increased. Not feeling uneasy in social situations".

"I have discovered my true self and I turn up to school on time every day. I have created connections with people and have come a long way in reading and writing." Students were also asked the question "Did you feel well supported with your schoolwork during your time at Waranara School?" Below are some of their answers:

"Everything has changed – I feel comfortable in who I am, I'm able to attend school and do well."

"All the teachers have really supported me while at Waranara, from helping me with classwork and assessments to just making sure I'm fine and also for pushing me so hard to complete my HSC, for which I am really grateful."

"Friendly, helpful environment."

"Always receiving adjustments I need, leniency around my attendance."

"I Feel mostly supported at school. It is really helpful with the smaller ratio of students in class which means the teachers can work more one on one with students. Having learning support in the classroom helps us feel even more supported."

"The teachers are always there to explain things, answer questions and help with whatever I needed."

Parent satisfaction



There are many informal opportunities for parents to engage with the Principal, teachers and staff, as well as regular parent/teacher evenings.

At the 2023 graduation ceremony, parents were asked to complete a survey. One question was "What are the school's greatest strengths?"

Below are some of the comments:

"We appreciate everyone's wonderful care of our son. He comes home so happy and proud of himself when he does his work. He loves to secretly brag that he finishes before others and this is awesome. The change in how he feels about education comes down to the Waranara Team and his care and support on a daily basis. We are incredibly grateful."

"The overall architecture/framework set up to support kids first and foremost."

"Teachers who love figuring out what makes each kid tick." "Small class sizes, supportive staff and great communication."

"Strong positive relationships between staff and students. Acknowledgement of positive steps and strong communication with parents."

"Flexible and student tailored attention, caring environment and relaxed atmosphere."

"Open communication with student and family. Staff persistence with students."

"The school's greatest strength is the staff. They are amazing! Their care, support and encouragement are exceptional."

"The culture of Waranara has saved my child's academic future from despair."

Teacher satisfaction



Waranara School is a safe, positive, supportive and collegial environment where issues can be raised and addressed professionally.

The Principal meets with each staff member fortnightly to discuss staff wellbeing and any staff concerns, as well as to monitor their level of satisfaction. Staff turnover at Waranara School is low.

This year staff were surveyed to determine their level of satisfaction in their role. This included the question "What do you like best about working at Waranara School?"

Some of their answers were:

"I have worked at Waranara for over 9 years. We work as a team to ensure that each student feels safe, heard and encouraged with their learning and sense of self. I am proud of what they achieve and their courage."






Waranara School – Income and Expenses 2023
